


The Socratic Discussion is patterned after the way that Socrates, the ancient Greek philosopher, conducted learning. Socrates believed that enabling students to **think for themselves** was more important than filling their heads with the "right answers." For this activity to be successful, it is necessary that you come to your fishbowl **prepared** to share ideas and opinions using the text to back up your answers. Answer the open-ended questions to the best of your ability, and include specific events or quotes from the novel to support your answers. The more detail and quotes you have, the better because you will be well-prepared for the fishbowl discussion.

Based on evidence presented in the story and your own experiences, what makes a good teacher?




